Annie Evelyn Parker-Wilson, born on December 23, 1933, in Dozier, Alabama, peacefully

transitioned from this life surrounded by love, on Monday, April 13, 2026. She was the cherished

daughter of Autry Parker and Annie Lee Florence-Parker, and the fourth of five children born to

their union.

Annie's siblings predeceased her: her brother, Eddie Clyde Parker, and her sisters, Helen

Parker-Folmar, Lurleen Parker, and Mary Parker-Curtis.

Annie's early years were marked by humble beginnings that shaped her strength, resilience,

and determination. As a child, she relocated to Farmingdale, New Jersey, where she was

lovingly raised by her Aunt Callie with her cousin Ida Bell McQueen. She later attended school in New Jersey before moving to New York City in her late teens with her maternal grandmother, where she began to carve out a life defined by independence and perseverance.

A beautiful, spirited, and determined young woman, Annie sought to build a stable and fulfilling life despite the challenges she faced. Her journey took her from New Jersey to New York City, to Queens, back to New Jersey, and eventually to Long Island. Along the way, she formed deep and lasting friendships that became her extended family and a strong circle of support, especially as much of her biological family remained in Alabama.

Annie married Silas Wilson, and together they resided in Queens, New York, where they

welcomed their only daughter, Pamela Wilson-Chance. Following their divorce, Annie remained

in Queens and made a courageous and determined decision to purchase her own home—an

extraordinary accomplishment for a single woman at that time. She fulfilled her promise to raise

her daughter in one stable home, overcoming countless obstacles with unwavering discipline,

focus and love.

Annie worked diligently throughout her life, including positions at JFK Airport and Leviton

Manufacturing as a keypunch operator. After taking early retirement from Leviton, she continued

her commitment to nurturing others by working as an Assistant Teacher at

Martin De Porres

School in the late 1980s, where she remained until retiring in the late 1990s.

She found joy in life's simple pleasures—walking, gardening, garage sales, and cheering

passionately for her beloved New York Knicks. Her feisty personality, sense of humor, and

caring nature made her unforgettable to all who knew her.

In 2002, Annie relocated back to New Jersey to be closer to her sister and extended family. She

cherished the open space, the beach, and the accessibility to loved ones.

During this time and

in the years following, she treasured her role as “Nana” to her granddaughter,

Jordyn. Their time

together was filled with walks, beach days, and shared moments outdoors, creating memories

that will be forever cherished.

In 2016, with her characteristic practicality and wisdom, Annie moved to Freeport, New York, to

live with her daughter Pamela, son-in-law Philip, and granddaughter Jordyn.

Even then, she

remained active and engaged—driving, helping manage the household, and continuing to live

life with her signature strength and personality.

In late 2021, Annie was diagnosed with multiple myeloma, which affected her kidney function.

With remarkable courage, she chose to undergo dialysis and chemotherapy.

She approached

these treatments with resilience, often referring to dialysis as her “job,”

demonstrating her ability

to face life's challenges with humor and determination. Her condition went into remission,

allowing her to continue enjoying time with family, friends, and eventually, the joy of her

great-grandson, Santana.

In the past year, Annie experienced health setbacks, including the return of cancer and the

cumulative effects of long-term dialysis. On January 2, 2026, she survived a stroke that

significantly impacted her mobility and communication. Despite these challenges, Annie

remained surrounded by love, care, and unwavering support from her family.

She leaves to cherish her memory her devoted daughter, Pamela Wilson-Chance; her loving

son-in-law, Philip; her beloved granddaughter, Jordyn; her treasured great-grandson, Santana;

along with a host of nieces, nephews, great-nieces, great-nephews, cousins, and many dear

friends who became family.
